Local History from Native Americans to Bohemians Personalized by a Lifelong Native Villager

Take a walk through four hundred years of the people, cultures, and arts of Greenwich Village, New York City. From the "castles" of the Native Americans, the abodes of the founding fathers of the republic to the hangouts of the artists, writers and characters of Greenwich Village.

See where Melville lived on a street named after his wife's grandfather.

Stop by the Washington Square Park fountain, where as a child, Marc played in the cooling summer water. By the same fountain, as a teenager, he listened to the poetry recited by a giant, muscular, former world heavyweight contender called King Brown.
